KHS Annual Meeting Tuesday: November 10, 2015 “Kingston: Crossroads of the Crossroads of the American Revolution”

The Kingston Historical Society’s Annual Meeting will be held at 7:30 pm at the Kingston Firehouse meeting room on Heathcote Road. The meeting is free and open to all. Refreshments will be served.



After a brief business meeting including election of trustees there will be a program focusing on the Revolutionary War and Kingston. After some background on the

Crossroads of the American Revolution George Luck, our KHS vice-president, will lead us through a video illustrated presentation describing the time Kingston’s history saw George Washington visit the area multiple times from 1776-1783. George Washington - not Luck, in 1776 rode down the main street fleeing the British, in 1777 stopped by after the Battle of Princeton for his “Conference on Horseback,” in 1778 had tea with Mrs. Berrien at Rockingham on his way to the Battle of Monmouth, and in 1783 stayed at Rockingham while the Continental Congress met in Princeton waiting to hear the peace treaty with the British was signed.

Drive by History

George Luck was interviewed on a recent episode of *Drive by History*, a new NJTV program that features NJ historic markers that one can “drive by.”



George talked about the January 3, 1777 “Conference on Horseback” with Ken Magos and Cindy Perman, program hosts, in the Kingston



KHS: Part of NJ History Events

The Jersey State History Fair was held at the Monmouth Battlefield, May 9th, 2015.

KHS took the lead in coordinating a display on Kingston with Kingston Greenways Association and Friends of Princeton Nursery Lands. Kingston’s rich historic and natural resources were displayed and we were able to engage others in conversations about the village and its environs in spite of intermittent rain.

Middlesex County (first annual) History Day was held at New Jersey Olde Towne in Piscataway, Sunday, May 31. Many people came to this event, which was sponsored by the Middlesex County Cultural and Heritage Commission. KHS was there also, with a display about Kingston and to tell visitors about Kingston and its history on a warm, but pleasant day. KHS was represented by Ceil Leedom and Robert von Zumbusch.

Trap Rock Quarry

An exhibit on the nearby Kingston quarry, including an ownership timeline for the quarry dating from 1850 can be seen at the Kingston Locktender’s House on weekends through November, 2015. Once known as Howell’s Quarry it has been substantially enlarged over the years. Since 1966 it has been operated by Trap Rock Industries, Inc. One of KHS’s ongoing displays on local history, it will be held over until spring when the Locktender’s House will again be opened on weekends.

Eno Terra’s “Taste of Place”

This year Friends of Princeton Nursery Lands (FPNL) was a beneficiary of Eno Terra’s annual “Taste of Place” event. Their food was delicious as usual even at this outdoor setting held August 16th on the bank of the D&R Canal – just opposite the Locktender’s House. KHS put up an additional exhibit on the history of the Princeton Nurseries, and the work FPNL is doing to preserve this part of Kingston’s history and Eno Terra’s “One Acre Farm” on the former Princeton Nurseries seedbeds.

Carnegie Lake and its Dam

The well-attended June 2, 2015 KHS Spring



program, held at the Kingston Firehouse, featured Carnegie Lake and its dam, pictured here. Princeton Facilities

engineer, Robert Ortego, gave an informative illustrated talk on the planned Carnegie Lake dam repairs and KHS president, Robert von Zumbusch, gave an equally informative illustrated talk on the history of the Lake and its dam. The Lake, a gift of Andrew Carnegie, was created c.1905 to provide a proper course for Princeton University’s crew, but it also created a major scenic and recreational amenity for the area.

Archives at the Locktender's House

Progress is being made in enumerating materials acquired, by donation or purchase, by KHS. Thanks to the work of KHS members the archives room on the second floor of the Locktender's House has been cleared up and files arranged to better access the many materials, both written and physical that have been collected over the years since the KHS was formed.

Moor-Potts Library Desk and other Kingston Treasures



KHS didn't want to see this grand piece of Kingston history leave home. It was made and used by local cabinetmaker, John F. Moor, c. 1870. The desk was acquired by the father of the late Dorothea "Jimmie" Potts at an estate auction after Moor's death in 1913; it was subsequently passed on to "Jimmie." KHS

purchased the desk from her estate. The desk is now on display in the Locktender's House.

In addition, a scale said to have been used in a Kingston hay-press, and later used by the Potts family, was also purchased at the Potts estate sale. This scale was made for the Howe Scale Co. by the Brandon Manufacturing Co. between 1869 and



1872. Scales were made in a range of sizes from counter top models to larger ones such as this 42 inch floor scale.

After acquiring these items, KHS trustees have decided to establish a special fund (see Page 4) to enable the acquisition of other historic Kingston items should they become available. As previously noted, most of the KHS collection of artifacts, photos, etc. has been acquired by donation or small purchases.



Our goal is to preserve, enhance and promote the history of the village of Kingston. Though space is limited, our collection efforts support these goals for the benefit of all.

With your continued financial support and other resources, the KHS was able to purchase a large library desk built c.1870 by local resident, John F. Moor for his use and later treasured by long-time resident, Jimmie Potts, who recently passed away. Another purchase from the same source was a floor scale, once used at a Kingston hay-press. Also, we recently discovered that John F. Moor was a Kingston Lock Tender in the 1880s.
