Kingston Historical Society Annual Meeting to Feature Film *Farming in the Millstone Valley: Past & Present*

7:30 pm Tuesday November 13th, 2018 at the Kingston Firehouse

After a very brief business meeting, the Program will include a showing of the film *Farming in the Millstone Valley: Past and Present* – a project of the Millstone Valley Preservation Coalition, of which KHS is a participating organization.

The Millstone Valley of central New Jersey, settled by Dutch farmers three centuries ago, helped New Jersey earn its Garden State nickname, and became the breadbasket of a booming New York City metropolis. That story, culminating in today's farm-to-table movement, is told in this documentary film.

Farming in the Millstone Valley: Past & Present, is a 35-minute video documentary based on a historic account by Jessie Lynn Havens of Montgomery Township, and made by the Millstone Valley Preservation Coalition of Rocky Hill in association with the Van Harlingen Historical Society of Montgomery.

Kingston residents will be delighted to find mention and images of Kingston, Princeton Nurseries, Rockingham and easily recognized local restaurants.

After the film, Carlo and Raoul Momo will give a post film note *The Farm to Table Movement* - a feature of the film and which the Terra Momo Restaurants, including Eno Terra in Kingston, are outstanding examples.

The film was premiered at the Garden Theatre in Princeton in June, but to the disappointment of many was sold out. For those disappointed in June this is an opportunity to see the film.¹

The meeting is free and open to all. Light refreshments will be served.

In coordination with the Annual Meeting a display on Kingston's Farms can be seen on weekends, October through November at the Locktender's House.

Kingston's Businesses walk/talk led by George Luck

Postponed this spring, due to weather, the walking tour was held on Saturday October 6, 2018.

The walk started at the Kingston Presbyterian Church, continued on Main Street and down the hill to the Kingston Basin area, ending at the Kingston Locktender's House. A series of old newspaper articles assembled by Ceil Leedom and artifacts assembled by George Luck related to Kingston's Businesses were on display and Paul Kayne's study models of the lock and former "A" Frame bridge were demonstrated.



Once again George Luck, Jr. demonstrated his deep knowledge of Kingston history as he talked about past businesses and told about their owners and

history. These businesses represent a time when Kingston was dependent on local merchants to supply groceries to shoes and to meet the needs of emerging businesses in the automotive era.

A display on Kingston's past businessses. remains in the Locktender's House on weekends through October and November.

KHS 2018 Spring Program Meeting

On June 5, 2018, historian and author Clifford W. Zink presented *The Roebling Legacy*. The Brooklyn Bridge – the "universal symbol of New York" – and the great cables on the George Washington and Golden Gate Bridges, the Roeblings and the thousands of their employees in Trenton and Roebling, N.J., helped shape modern life, built one of America's best company towns – "a model in every respect" – and created America's first sports car, the Mercer Raceabout.
